

1. Alabama State Board of Pharmacy

In Alabama pharmacy technicians are regulated. You are required to apply to the Alabama State Board of Pharmacy to obtain a licensure. The state board is responsible for licensing and registration of Alabama pharmacists, pharmacy technicians and pharmacies. It regulates the practice and operation of pharmacies and distribution of prescription drugs in the state of Alabama.

The Board is comprised of five members, all of whom are pharmacists licensed and actively practicing pharmacy and/or pharmacy administration in the State of Alabama for at least the past five years. Three of the Board members are appointed by the Governor, while the other two are elected by ballot.

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2. Alaska Board of Pharmacy

The Alaska Board of Pharmacy is tasked to design and implement effective regulatory and control measures for the practice of pharmacy in the state. Pharmacy Technicians are required to apply for their license to the Alaska Board of Pharmacy.

The Board is authorized to make decisions as regards licensing and take the necessary action against those who violate state licensing laws. It is comprised of seven members, five of whom are pharmacists and two from the general public. The Governor appoints all board members, who are then confirmed by the Legislature.

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3. Arizona State Board of Pharmacy

The Arizona State Board of Pharmacy is tasked to regulate pharmacy practice as well as the manufacture, storage, distribution, and sale of medicines and pharmacy-related devices. The regulations they adopt are geared towards the promotion of public welfare, health, and safety.

Specifically, the Board is in charge of issuing licenses and permits, conducting investigations, and adjudicating violations of pharmacy laws and regulations. Additionally, the Board inspects permitted facilities to make sure pharmacy rules and regulations are always upheld. They also promulgate and review the laws governing pharmacy in the State of Arizona.

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4. Arkansas State Board of Pharmacy

The Arkansas State Board of Pharmacy was established to regulate the various aspects of the Arkansas drug delivery system. They issue licenses to pharmacists and pharmacies alike, and they also regulate the distribution, delivery, and/or sale of medicines, medical gases and equipment, and pharmacy-related devices.

The Board conducts compliance inspections and tests for pharmacies, and monitor pharmacists to ensure that the state's pharmacy laws are upheld at all times. Furthermore, they make sure that information on the laws governing pharmacy and related fields in the State of Arkansas is readily accessible.

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5. California State Board of Pharmacy

The California State Board of Pharmacy aims to ensure that the public receives the best possible service from their pharmacists and that pharmaceutical products are appropriately prescribed and used. They hope to achieve this goal through proper education, open communication, effective legislation, a systematic licensing process, and strict enforcement of laws and regulations.

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6. Colorado State Board of Pharmacy

The mission of the Colorado State Board of Pharmacy is to ensure that the consumer is protected at all times. They aim to do this by regulating pharmacists, pharmacies, and pharmacy interns as well as prescription drugs outlets and wholesalers.

The Board further works towards the fulfillment of their mission by properly implementing licensing regulations, conducting investigations of related complaints, and enforcing the necessary actions against proven violators of the laws and regulations governing pharmacy practice in the state.

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7. Connecticut Commission of Pharmacy

Comprised of seven governor-appointed members, the Connecticut Commission of Pharmacy governs and monitors pharmacy practice within the state. They are responsible for the registration and licensing of qualified pharmacists, pharmacy interns, and pharmacies in Connecticut.

The Commission also addresses pharmacy-related complaints, conducts investigations into these complaints, and metes out the necessary sanctions against proven violators of governing laws and regulations. Any sanction taken is recorded in the minutes of their regular meetings, which take place once each month.

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8. Delaware State Board of Pharmacy

Other than issuing licenses to pharmacists and pharmacy interns practicing within the state, the Delaware State Board of Pharmacy is also responsible for licensing pharmacies as well as the manufacturers and distributors of pharmaceuticals, retailers of veterinary drugs, and medical gas dispensers.

Furthermore, the Board is tasked to maintain a registry of drug outlets and ensure that these outlets implement safe practices at all times. They also promulgate the rules and regulations governing pharmacy practice in Delaware, address complaints, and impose sanctions as needed.

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9. District of Columbia Board of Pharmacy

The District of Columbia Board of Pharmacy is responsible for regulating pharmacy and pharmaceutical detailing practice within the state. They advise the Mayor on standards and procedures to be followed, evaluate applications and issue licenses to qualified applicants, and address-related complaints.

Furthermore, the Board conducts investigations into complaints and enforces the law by handing out necessary sanctions. Seven members—five pharmacists and two consumers—are appointed by the Mayor to a three-year term, with each being eligible to serve two consecutive terms.

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10. Florida Board of Pharmacy

The primary responsibility of the Florida Board of Pharmacy is to ensure that every individual practicing pharmacy in the state and every pharmacy operating within Florida is duly qualified and diligently follows safe practices.

The Board closely monitors the licensing process and the practice of pharmacy in the state. They also make sure that pharmacy professionals practicing in Florida have the right competency levels, receive continuing education, and continuously apply safe practices in providing pharmaceutical products and services to consumers.

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11. Georgia State Board of Pharmacy

Georgia State Board of Pharmacy is in charge of regulating the state's pharmacists and pharmacies.

The Board strives to achieve their goal of promoting the health and safety of consumers by thoroughly reviewing applications for pharmacy practice, issuing licenses to qualified applicants, and regulating pharmacy practice throughout Georgia.

In the event of complaints being filed, the Board conducts investigations and metes out sanctions as needed.

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12. Guam Board of Examiners for Pharmacy

The Guam Board of Examiners for Pharmacy handles licensing for pharmacists and pharmacy technicians in the state. They are also responsible for processing and issuing licenses for those who wish to operate pharmacies and pharmacy outlets in Guam.

In carrying out their responsibilities, the Board ensures that the Pharmacy Practice Act and all other laws, rules, and regulations governing pharmacy practice in the state are followed. In case of complaints, they conduct investigations and take the necessary actions.

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13. Hawaii State Board of Pharmacy

The Hawaii State Board of Pharmacy is comprised of seven members, five of whom are licensed pharmacists practicing in the state and the other two members of the general public. They are in charge of licensing not only for pharmacists in Hawaii, but also for pharmacies and wholesale prescription drugs distributors. The Board also handles the issuance of other pharmacy-related permits.

Complaints may also be filed involving perceived violations of the laws and regulations governing pharmacy practice in the state, in which case the Board shall conduct investigations and apply the necessary sanctions.

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14. Idaho State Board of Pharmacy

The Idaho State Board of Pharmacy is comprised of four licensed pharmacists and one consumer, all of whom are appointed by the Governor. The Board aims to promote the health and safety of the general public, a goal they hope to fulfill by putting in place appropriate and effective control and regulatory measures governing pharmacy practice in Idaho.

They handle licensing and registration for pharmacy practitioners, administer examinations, put in place requirements for continuing education, address complaints, and take the necessary action against pharmacy law violators.

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15. Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation, Division of Professional Regulation State Board of Pharmacy

The State Board of Pharmacy in Illinois is under the umbrella of the IDFPR; it is tasked to regulate activities of pharmacists and pharmacies alike. The Board has nine members who have all been appointed by the Governor. Seven of these members are licensed pharmacists practicing within the state; the other two are chosen from the general public.

The Board is responsible for ensuring that every individual granted a license to practice pharmacy in Illinois is duly qualified, highly disciplined, and always exhibits professional conduct. They set the standards and make sure these standards are followed.

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16. Indiana Board of Pharmacy

All appointed by the Governor, the seven members of the Indiana Board of Pharmacy serve a four-year term. Of the seven, one serves as representative of the general public and six have to be licensed pharmacists from a variety of pharmacy practice settings; one must currently be working as a hospital pharmacist.

The Board offers licensing services, investigates complaints, and implements any necessary disciplinary actions. They make sure that pharmacists, pharmacies, pharmacy technicians, pharmacy interns, wholesale drug distributors, remote dispensing facilities, and medical equipment service providers in the state uphold pharmacy practice laws at all times.

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17. Iowa Board of Pharmacy

Five licensed pharmacists practicing in the state and two members of the general public comprise the Iowa Board of Pharmacy; they are all appointed by the state's Governor. Their main responsibility is to regulate pharmacy practice as well as the legal dispensing and distribution of all prescription drugs and other pharmacy-related substances within the state.

In fulfillment of these responsibilities, the Board handles the licensing of pharmacists, facilitates continuing education for pharmacy practitioners, and promote regulations governing the distribution of prescription drugs and related substances. They also perform compliance audits of registered parties and implement disciplinary actions as needed.

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18. Kansas State Board of Pharmacy

The primary mission of the Kansas State Board of Pharmacy is to ensure that every individual involved in pharmacy practice in the state has gone through the proper licensing and registration process. The overall goal is to promote a better understanding of pharmacy practice and protect the health and safety of consumers.

The Board aims to fulfill their mission and achieve their goal by ensuring compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations governing pharmacy practice in Kansas. They investigate complaints and implement sanctions on proven violators.

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19. Kentucky Board of Pharmacy

As with their counterparts in other states, the Kentucky Board of Pharmacy is mandated to promote the public's health, safety, and welfare by enforcing pharmacy laws and regulating pharmacy practice in the state. The Board aims to accomplish their primary goal through a thorough testing and qualification process for those who aspire to practice pharmacy as well as by ensuring discipline among licensed practicing pharmacists.

The Board also ensures that there is easy access to updated information and laws governing pharmacy. It is funded solely through the fees collected from the issuance of licenses and permits.

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20. Louisiana Board of Pharmacy

Established in 1888, the Louisiana Board of Pharmacy is mandated to regulate pharmacy practice in the state, with the end goal of promoting the public health and safety. They aim to fulfill their mission by setting specific standards that those who wish to practice pharmacy in Louisiana have to meet in order to obtain the required licenses and/or permits.

The Board also monitors and regulates pharmacy practice in the state, to ensure that governing laws are upheld. Violators are sanctioned accordingly. Seventeen members comprise the Board, with two pharmacists representing each pharmacy district and one public representative.

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21. Maine Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation Board of Pharmacy

The primary mandate of the Maine Board of Pharmacy is to protect public health and safety. They implement regulatory measures applicable to all pharmacists and pharmacies in the state.

Specifically, the Board conducts examinations and issues licenses to all qualified pharmacists and pharmacy assistants. They also set up regulatory and control measures for the sale and distribution of all drugs. Furthermore, they set standards of quality for pharmacy-related products and services.

When complaints are filed, the Board conducts investigations and implements sanctions on proven violators of pharmacy laws.

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22. Maryland Board of Pharmacy

The Board promotes and ensures top-quality healthcare in the state's field of pharmacy by setting up a systematic licensing and registration process for pharmacists, pharmacies, and prescription drug distributors. They also ensure that the quality of healthcare is maintained by continually educating the public and addressing related complaints.

There are 12 members comprising the Maryland Board of Pharmacy. Ten of them are licensed pharmacists representing the various pharmacy practice areas in the state, and two are consumers appointed by the state's Governor.

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23. Massachusetts Board of Registration in Pharmacy

The Massachusetts Board of Registration in Pharmacy facilitates a licensing and registration process for pharmacists and pharmacies that help ensure the best service for consumers in the state. They have an accreditation system in place to make sure the state's practicing pharmacists come from only the best pharmacy colleges.

The Board further ensures that information regarding pharmacy practice and related topics are readily available to the public. Additionally, they uphold pharmacy laws by receiving and investigating complaints, and taking the necessary disciplinary actions against proven violators.

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24. Michigan Board of Pharmacy

As provided for in the Public Health Code, the Michigan Board of Pharmacy has the authority to promote public health and safety by regulating pharmacy practice in Michigan. They are also mandated to set standards for all those wish to practice pharmacy within the state.

The Board also has the power to limit or prevent the sale of drugs that fail to comply with the provisions of the Code. Furthermore, they are responsible for disciplining licensed pharmacy practitioners who, by violating governing laws and regulations, are proven to have compromised public health and safety.

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25. Minnesota Board of Pharmacy

The mission of the Minnesota Board of Pharmacy is to promote and preserve public health and safety, and they aim to fulfill that mission by ensuring that pharmaceuticals are safely distributed within their jurisdiction and that citizens of the state receive only topnotch pharmaceutical care.

The Board is also responsible for the licensing of pharmacists and pharmacies in Minnesota as well as for resolving complaints and taking disciplinary actions as needed.

Nine individuals comprise the Board, six of whom are licensed pharmacists practicing in the state and three representing the general public.

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26. Mississippi Board of Pharmacy

Seven members appointed by the Governor comprise the Mississippi Board of Pharmacy. An administrative staff assists them in carrying out their tasks and in fulfilling their mission of promoting public health and safety.

The Board is mandated to regulate and control pharmacy practice as well as the distribution of pharmacy-related devices and prescription drugs within the state. They handle the licensing and registration of pharmacists and pharmacies in Mississippi, and they receive and resolve complaints, implementing sanctions wherever necessary.

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27. Missouri Board of Pharmacy

The primary mission of the Missouri Board of Pharmacy is to serve and protect the general public, and they aim to fulfill this mission by providing a regulatory system that is within easy access. This system helps ensure that licenses are issued only to qualified individuals and that high standards for pharmacy practice are met.

The Board is comprised of seven members, six of whom are licensed pharmacists currently practicing in the State of Missouri and one representative of the general public. The Governor appoints all members to a five-year term.

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28. Montana Board of Pharmacy

The Montana Board of Pharmacy, based in Helena, provides licensure and renewal for all pharmacists within the state. They handle regulations and requirements for all related practices, including distribution and ongoing education. The board also has rehabilitation programs for members with addiction problems. For the licensure, they offer two distinct application types: individual and facilities. The board's coverage extends to other personnel types, such as wholesalers, internships, and pharmacies.

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29. Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health, Licensure Unit

The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services is the official state licensing agency, and is based in Lincoln. They provide medical aid for single patients and families, and are also responsible for the control and distribution of all pharmaceuticals. It is the Board that determines the requirements for approved pharmacists and other support staff, including pharmacy technicians and internships. If you are planning to practice in the state, or become an intern, visit them learn more about proper application.

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30. Nevada State Board of Pharmacy

The Nevada State Board of Pharmacy is the regulating body in the state of Nevada; it is based in Reno. They handle certification for new applicants and renewals for existing members. The board approves or revokes the licensure. They also deal with the investigation of complaints by customers and disciplinary action for violations. If you are a patient or customer, you can call the board for complaints or concerns. You can also find out which pharmacies near you are officially registered.

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31. New Hampshire Board of Pharmacy

The New Hampshire Board of Pharmacy is the state's official qualification board for pharmaceutical work. Based in Concord, they check on all applicants to see who can be licensed. They also handle renewal of licenses for existing members. The Board keeps a close eye on any ongoing education done by approved members. This includes those working in therapy, medicine, and body work. Visit them if your practice is or will be involving prescriptions and pharmaceuticals of any kind.

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32. New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy

The New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy is New Jersey's official regulation board, and is based in Newark. They ensure proper certification for qualified pharmacists, and handle those who violate official state regulations. They keep a directory of all verified applicants, along with issued disciplinary actions. Their applicants can be pharmacists, technicians or pharmaceutical organizations working in and out of the state. Visit them if you are looking for approved and registered pharmacies near your home, or if you have any concerns regarding a licensed practitioner.

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33. New Mexico Board of Pharmacy

The New Mexico Board of Pharmacy is the regulating body in charge of all pharmaceutical-related work and substances in the state of New Mexico. They handle the enforcement and protection of public health by ensuring proper pharmaceutical practice. They also restrict and control the distribution of dangerous substances, and conduct investigations and disciplinary action for those in violation of its laws. If you suspect this of any registered pharmacists, visit the Board to file an official complaint.

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34. New York State Board of Pharmacy

The New York State Board of Pharmacy is the official government regulatory body for all pharmacies in the state. Based in Albany, they keep track of each licensed member or organization, and enforce a set of guidelines on accredited members' conduct or service. The board offers different application forms and handles both written and online prescriptions by their registered members. They have special licenses for members planning to engage in collaborative drug therapy management. Visit them if you have any plans to work in pharmaceutical practice.

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35. North Carolina Board of Pharmacy

The North Carolina Board of Pharmacy is the official pharmaceutical regulatory body for in the state and is based in Chapel Hill. They handle the licensure of pharmacists, technicians, researchers, and interns. Application can be approved either through official state examination or by reciprocity. For those looking for registered facilities, the board keeps an online directory of approved applicants. This covers both the personnel and the pharmacy itself. Visit them if you are looking for the nearest registered pharmacy.

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36. North Dakota State Board of Pharmacy

The North Dakota State Board of Pharmacy is the state's official government regulatory body. They are based in Bismarck. The board handles all licensure and permit processes for professional pharmaceutical work. Their services include verification, renewal, and printing of all certificates. The board also caters to veterinarians and

third-party logistics providers, both for licensure and annual renewal. If you are planning to work in a pharmaceutical practice in North Dakota, visit them for registration. You may also visit them if you have any complaints regarding licensed pharmacists.

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37. State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy

The State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy, located in Columbus, is the local governing regulatory body for pharmaceutical practice. They handle the licensing, and determine the requirements needed for professionals to work in the state. They also investigate any complaints or violations made about or by members of the practice. Their coverage not only extends to pharmacists, but also to facilities and technicians. If you want to become an intern or work in a registered practice, visit them to know more about the process and the nearest registrants.

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38. Oklahoma State Board of Pharmacy

The Oklahoma State Board of Pharmacy is one of the bodies responsible for protecting public health in the state. They monitor and regulate all pharmaceutical practices, including all first-party licensees and facilities. They have a directory of over 18,000 registrants. They also investigate any concerns or complaints made by patients or their families, following up with the applicable necessary disciplinary actions. If you are a first-time applicant, visit them for a bi-annual licensing or other renewal and registration services.

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39. Oregon State Board of Pharmacy

The Oregon State Board of Pharmacy is the official regulating government body in charge of all pharmaceutical work in the state. They are based in Portland, and approve, reject, or revoke the applications and licenses of all professional pharmacists. This also extends to facilities such as pharmacies and out-of-state distributors. They also handle the proposal and approval of any pharmaceutical-related rules such as requirements for licensure. Visit them for any information regarding registry for full-time practice.

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40. Pennsylvania State Board of Pharmacy

The Pennsylvania State Board of Pharmacy is the regulatory body for all pharmacies and pharmacists in the state of Pennsylvania. They protect and enforce the welfare of local citizens by presiding over the licensure of professional pharmacists and their personnel. The coverage includes pharmacies, distributors, internships, and technicians. Visit them in Harrisburg if you have any concerns or complaints regarding licensed pharmacists. You can also contact their office to learn more about the nearest registered pharmacies in your local area.
