As always, the use of the most current version of an IRB document (found on the IRB website) will improve the speed of the IRB review process.

## Q:What type of review is required for an interventional research study?

- A: Most interventional studies require Expedited or Full Committee review. At Campbell most interventional studies are "no greater than minimal risk" requiring Expedited review. There are two exceptions for reviewing "no greater than minimal risk" studies on adults which do not require Expedited review. They are:
  - 1. If the project **IS** federally funded or research activities require review under federal regulations.
    - Exempt, Category 3: May be used if the research is not greater than minimal risk and the study meets the criteria for Benign Behavioral Intervention\*; **or**
  - 2. If the project is **NOT** federally funded or research activities **DO NOT** require review under federal regulations and the study meets the criteria for Registration Project/FLEX review.
    - Registration, Category 10: May be used if the research is not greater than minimal risk and is a psychosocial intervention that meets the same criteria as for Benign Behavioral Intervention\*.

\*Benign Behavioral Interventions "are brief in duration, harmless, painless, not physically invasive, not likely to have significant adverse lasting impact on the subjects, and the investigator has no reason to think the subjects will find the interventions offensive or embarrassing." The brief in duration requirement only pertains to the intervention itself, and not the data collection. If the research involves deceiving the subjects regarding the nature or purposes of the research, the subject must authorize the deception through a prospective agreement. The subject is to be informed that they will be unaware of or misled regarding the nature or purpose of the research.
